SECTIONS FOR REVIEW

1. The blueprint to create the jurisprudence exam is weighted as follows:

Provincially, nurses registered and licensed with the Saskatchewan Registered Nursing Association (SRNA) may prescribe when provided the authority to do so under both [The Drug Schedules Regulations 1997](#) and appropriate legislation regulating the practice of Nursing in Saskatchewan.
